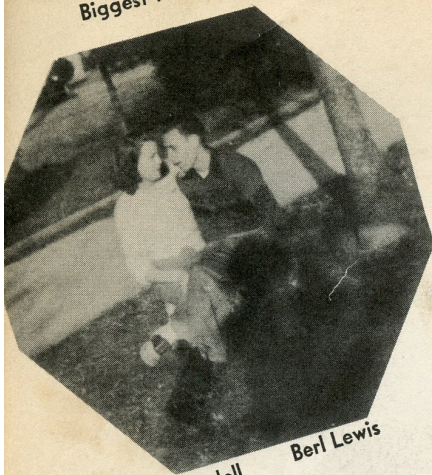
After leaving the school, I noticed an attractive home near the Post Office, and was told that this was the home of Mrs. Wheeler Bowen, whom I knew as June Jones.
