


Man Never Ceases To Learn



"It was refreshing to see a high school play that had something to say."











Assemblies Highlight Year

Throughout the year, many students achieved heights worthy of recognition. Some were in sports, some in academics, others in all-round qualities. Many awards have been acknowledged in their respective sections; the remaining are described on these pages.



In the county "Young America Speaks and Acts" essay contest sponsored by the VFW ladies auxiliary, Diane Garner received a \$25 savings bond for second place. Donald Leatherman and Debbie Campbell tied for third.

Janet Mizelle was the recipient of the Home Economics Betty Crocker Award. She advanced to state competition.

Brant Barnes was the first recipient of the Carteret Theatre Workshop's "The Genie" for theatre excellence. The award will be an annual affair.

Four American Legion citizenship honors were presented on awards day. Jean Davenport and Stuart Shelton were runners-up with Maryann Hyman and Kenny Broadhurst the winners.

Several students from West participated in the Gold Star program. Winners on the district level were Jean Davenport for General Scholarship and Shelton Brown for Citizenship.

The recipients of the "I Dare You" awards for 1967 were Janet Mizelle and John Fussell.





CARL HOWARD JOHNSON 1949-1966















On the first day of school there were many unknown faces peering into doors, contemplating room numbers, and generally feeling lost. These strange invaders were the Freshmen.


