

In addition she uses her spare time teaching government, P.O.D., and World History. This year, for the first time, she is even sponsoring the N.H.S.



Health occupations not only introduces the student to the health field, but to concepts of personal, family and community health and disease control, and to specific job opportunities in health fields.










freshman team enters first year at west




Student organizers were scheduled to lead discussions during the three lunches, but most remained in the background as several lively discussions developed independently among the participants.


Although discussion groups began small, many curious students eventually wandered over and joined the debate.
