

Rolling Seniors make their last year a memorable one



2005 Who's Who








How was your junior year?

ECHS Freshmen had places to find and people to meet



Rebecca Cole remarked, "I really like East Carteret. Everyone is super nice and I've had a lot of fun playing volleyball and doing colorguard."








T.J Courman's life long passion for football further intensified his senior year. T.J stated, "Football was a lot of fun this year because we actually won! It was a good year boys!"





The boys' final record was 14 wins and 11 loses. They were 11 and 1 in the conference. Brandon Campbell said, "It was hard









Yearbook Staffers Roll With the Punches and a New Format

Led by Ms. Raines, the vearbook class focuses on creating the yearly "East Wind" for the students at East Carteret. During the 2004-2005 school year, the organization of the class was changed over the two semesters. First semester staffers were separated into different groups according to skills like copy writing, technology, photography, and ads. Each group completed a part of a layout and then passed it on to the next group. For the spring semester the system was changed. Instead of students being grouped into teams by skill, there were three teams, each comprised of all the components of the vearbook staff, plus an ad team. Everyone combined their creative talents to produce a layout together rather than working separately on the various topics. Regardless of each semester's organization everyone worked towards the

same goal of designing a creative, interesting, and informative recap of the 2004-2005 school year. Yearbook teams also faced many obstacles, including: working peaceably in teams, perfecting their craft, and meeting deadlines. It is imperative that layouts are finished in a timely manner due to the fact that the publisher will charge a high extension price for missed deadlines. Another major problem the yearbook staff faced was computer malfunctions. During the school year the computers were continually down because of viruses or other technical issues, leaving the students nothing to work with. Even with obstacles the vearbook staff and Ms. Raines worked to finish the book before the end of May. Next year, the yearbook will have some major changes. The book will be published entirely in online and in color and it will arrive before graduation.
